 The father of David was Jesse a Bethlehemite, son of Obed who was the son of Boaz and Ruth, and the 10th in direct descent from his father Jacob. We are not told as much about Jesse as we might like. He is already an old man when we first see him, and it is remarkable that we are told nothing about David's mother. God breathed these words showing Jesse's sole interest to us is that he had David among his sons. We bow to this old Bethlehemite because of the branch that grew out of his roots.

- Jehovah sees not as man sees, and worked in a way strange to our eyes. We would not have committed our coming king to Jesse to bring up. Lonely sheepfolds are a strange school for a future king.
- The first day Jonathan and David ever saw one another was on the day when Goliath fell under David's sling. Jonathan stood beside his father Saul, spectator of the never to be forgotten scene. Brave, bold and practiced in war, as Jonathan was, he had not been bold enough to

face the gigantic braggart. Along with all the army on both sides he had been astounded to see a Bethlehemite fresh from his father's sheep, step into the open to face the champion of the opposing host. Jonathan's heart went out to David, and his soul was knit to David. Things of the same kind are knit together; things that are of the same substance, and fibre, and texture, and strength, and endurance. You knit a threefold cord to a threefold cord. Jonathan's soul was a chain of gold, of the same size, and strength, and purity, and beauty of David's soul.

Jonathan, being the elder man, longed for a soul like David, and the friendship knit that day has been example of all true friendships among men ever since.

 The 18th chapter of First Samuel contains some of the most difficult and dangerous passages in David's life. Four times in that chapter David's wisdom is remarked on. David went withersoever Saul sent him, and behaved himself wisely. After the foolish women aroused Saul's envy endangering David's life with thoughtless songs and silly dances, we read again that David behaved himself wisely in all his ways. When Saul saw David behaved himself very wisely, Saul was afraid of David.

Summing up David's residence at Saul's difficult and dangerous court, the sacred writer says David behaved himself more wisely than all the servants of Saul. David's name was celebrated for his wisdom.

 Saul had promised his daughter to the man who should rid him of Goliath. David had done that. Brought out by this matter of marriage was Saul's diabolical design to get David murdered. Think of Saul's feelings when he looked up and saw David stand on the spot where he had just risen from sleep, with his sword in one hand

and the skirt of his robe in the other. When Saul looked up, David stooped with his face to the earth, and bowed himself; saying see the skirt of thy robe in my hand and know that some bade me kill thee, mine eye spared thee. I will not put mine hand against my lord for he is the Lord's anointed. David enters Saul's court. It was divine nature in David.

 Never were man and wife more unequally yoked than was David, the man after God's own heart, with Michal, Saul's daughter. The greatest day of David's life was a day of death

to Michal. You must understand all the ark of God was to David, and the home bringing with sacrificed oxen and fatlings. David was beside himself, leaping and dancing before the Lord till Michal despised him in her heart. Had she worked for the day with her own hands; she too would have sung and danced. Being the woman she was, having the husband she had, Michal could not but feel both scorn and affliction that day. They were never made for one another. It was impossible they could ever be happy as man and wife. Michal was proud

and cold as if she had been the daughter of Lucifer, as indeed she was; a divine looking glass for all angry and outspoken wives. What a gulf there was between David and Michal; between Jesus and His brethren. The Holy Ghost knew what He was doing, and for whom He was doing it; when He put that day in David's life into our sacred Scriptures; and this; 19 husbands, love your wives, and be not bitter against them. Colossians 3: 19 ASV
